Chicago Longitudinal Study: Updated Report on Juvenile Delinquency Outcomes

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James Dimitri Topitzes Joshua Mersky CLS Delinquency Outcome Overview: The Chicago Longitudinal Study (CLS) has updated its previous January 2001 Report on Juvenile Delinquency Outcomes based on several changes. First, the sample size increased from 1404 to 1406 due to updates from Cook County juvenile court personnel and young adult self-report data. This sample is comprised of study participants who resided in the Chicago area at the age of 10 or older, or for whom delinquency data from outside the Chicago area, e.g., Milwaukee and Madison, could be verified. Second, 16 new cases were coded as delinquent based on the updated Cook County information, changing the number of delinquent cases in the study sample from 278 to 294. Third, a completed survey with the CLS adult sample (N=1142) provided new information on juvenile arrest from which updated self-report and combined self-report/official report variables could be created. Tables 1-3 of this revised report incorporate these sample updates while also including additional delinquency outcomes relative to the original report.

Indicators: Table 1 reports unadjusted descriptive statistics along with unadjusted mean group comparisons for various delinquency indicators. We have added, from the original delinquency report, School age Program participation as a category for mean comparisons to go along with the previously listed categories: gender, CPC Preschool Program participation, and CPC Extended Program participation. We have also added the following variables as new delinquency indicators: any drug arrest/petition, any non-violent arrest/petition only, total number of juvenile arrests, total number of violent juvenile charges, total number of drug juvenile charges, any self-report juvenile arrest ages 22-24, any self-report juvenile arrest ages 22-24 combined with self-reports from ages 15, and a combined measure of any self-report with any official report of juvenile arrest incorporating the ages 22-24 measure, socioemotional maturity ages 9-11, and socioemotional maturity ages 6-11. Dropped from this table were the following: adult incarceration and number of years of school infractions. Current results show that 20.9% of the sample had an official juvenile arrest/petition by age 18, 12.5% had an official juvenile violent arrest, and 32.0% had an official or self-reported juvenile arrest. Each of these rates represents an increase from those previously published in the January 2001 report. Mean group comparisons for gender reveal that boys and girls differ significantly on each indicator in the expected direction; boys having significantly poorer outcomes than girls. CPC Preschool program participation is associated with lower rates or scores on delinquency outcomes on all but the following indicators: total number of violent charges, total number of drug charges, acting out, school infractions, and self-report arrest. Notably, the CPC Preschool Program group still has significantly lower rates, versus the comparison group, on all dichotomous indicators of official juvenile arrest and on a combined measure of self-report and official juvenile arrests. The Preschool Program group also has mean scores indicating significantly higher functioning on nearly all socioemotional and behavioral measures relative to the comparison group. Mean comparisons among School age Program groups and CPC Extended Program groups show significant differences in the expected direction on several of the early school problem behavior measures and on the any school infraction measure.

Correlates: Table 2 presents a correlation matrix with the following: early risk indicators, grade 8 reading achievement, high school completion, and five delinquency measures. The delinquency measures include any official arrest, any self-report arrest, combined official and self-report arrest, any official violent arrest, and any official drug arrest. Notably, all delinquency measures are strongly and significantly correlated with each other. Also, the high school completion measure, along with the grade 8 reading measure, is significantly negatively correlated with all delinquency measures. Last, early risk factors that correlate significantly and positively with three or more delinquency measures include family risk index, single parent status, mother unemployment status, TANF/AFDC participation, free school lunch eligibility, and four or more risk factors from ages 0-3.

Subgroup Comparisons: Table 3a and 3b highlight subgroup comparisons on two outcomes: the official juvenile arrest measure and the combined self-report/official juvenile arrest measure. These tables include rates of arrest for high versus low risk groups using various risk/protective factors to define these groups. Each dichotomized group is also split on gender, CPC Preschool Program participation, School Age Program participation and CPC Extended Intervention to determine differential rates of arrest by program or gender subgroup. The following factors appear to produce notable and consistent differential unadjusted rates of arrest: gender, family structure, mother's educational attainment, poverty status defined by school free/reduced lunch program participation, AFDC status, multiple risk status, socioemotional classroom adjustment, peer social skills, reading achievement, school mobility, grade retention, and child welfare history.
